

A 7th Grade Project with Mrs. Shelton and Mr. Maloon



Driving/Essential Question(s):

What is the cause and effect relationship between immigration policies in the U.S. and neighboring islands?

How can we capture the personal experiences of immigrants from neighboring islands?

As student historians, we have learned about interacted with, and documented the history of Puerto Rico, Cuba, Haiti, Dominican Republic, and the Bahamas, to better understand the causal relationships that exist between the U.S. and neighboring islands.

To learn more about topics within our project we collaborated with various community members, including:

To demonstrate our understanding about the experiences of immigrants in our neighboring island nations, we:

- surveyed the TCS staff and students to find representatives from each of the islands.
- conducted video and/or audio interviews to document the personal stories of those connected to immigration.
- creatively told the interviewees story through song, dance, digital, and visual arts.
